Upcoming February 16, 2019: Speaker: Matthew Quirk Writing Thrillers: Is Truth Really Stranger than Fiction?

Matthew Quirk might be the most underrated political thriller novelist working today. Known for his Mike Ford and, more recently, his John Hayes books. A *New York Times* bestselling author, Quirk's first book in a year, *The Night Agent*, released January 2019.



"The Night Agent is bigger and riskier than anything I've ever done, and I can't wait to get it into readers' hands."

It's unclear whether Quirk, who studied history and literature at Harvard before reporting on crime, private military contractors, terrorism prosecutions, and international gangs for *The Atlantic*, intends for *The Night Agent* to be the first book

in a new series or a standalone thriller, but the book will star a young FBI agent named Peter Sutherland who goes on the hunt to uncover a Russian mole inside the White House.



Upcoming March 16, 2019 DETE MESERVE

The Joys & Challenges of Adapting a Book to Screen

Dete Meserve is one of SCWA's favorite guests, and the award-winning, bestselling author of *Good Sam, Perfectly Good Crime*, and *The Space Between*. Her first novel, *Good Sam*, is in post-production as a feature film for Netflix and will be released in Spring 2019.

Dete will be talking to us about the challenges of adapting a book to screen.

Like her heroine Kate Bradley, award-winning author Dete Meserve keeps looking for people who are doing extraordinary good for others, sometimes at great personal sacrifice. Instead of tracking a killer or kidnapper, Dete's mysteries seek to uncover the helpers, the rescuers, and the people who inspire us with selfless acts of kindness. *Good Sam* is the first in her Kate Bradley Mysteries series, followed by *A Perfectly Good Crime*.

Dete is an accomplished creator and producer of independent movies and award-winning television shows as well as a bestselling novelist. As a key member of the executive team at Wind Dancer Films, Meserve has been a major player, overseeing its successful properties including films *What Women Want* (Mel Gibson), *Where the Heart Is* (Natalie Portman), *Bernie* (Jack Black), *What Men Want* (Taraji P. Henson) and *Good Sam* (Netflix).

When she's not writing, she is a film and television producer in Los Angeles and a partner and CEO of Wind Dancer Films. Meserve lives in Los Angeles with her husband and three children--and a very good cat that rules them all.

January Highlights – David Putnam Dave on Writing



Dave's early years as a rookie cop were often spent on surveillance, where he spent hours and hours of empty time reading. In fact, he wrote his first four novels in a cop car. In 1989 he started going to writer's conferences to learn the craft of writing, and started writing four pages a day, often in the a.m.

When he felt he was ready, he went after literary agents the way he went after crooks, laying in wait for them. He got four agents that way, two good, two terrible. Dave went on to accumulate 150 rejections before he started to get two-page replies (also rejections, but encouraging). He got to the acquisitions phase two times, and though he fought for the slot, he lost.

He started stalking authors at conferences, starting the conversations and taking pictures together, hoping the connection would help.

Dave tried every genre, and eventually shifted from mysteries to thrillers, which suited his dyslexia – more action than detail. He had discovered that mysteries worked best in odd numbers, with three, five, or seven scenes in each chapter, and an odd number of chapters for the book.

Thrillers worked best for Dave with one scene per chapter, which forces economy, and forces cadence, making the story a page turner. He feels that cadence is everything. The story runs better, and faster.

Dave's Four C's of Writing:

- Conflict set it up quickly and make it short
- Complication adding motivation to the conflict starts the complications
- Crisis keep it short
- Conclusion make the reader happy

His #1 Rule: You cannot confuse the reader!

Drop the reader into you FICTIVE DREAM. The story is not story – it's *character*, and how he demonstrates the story. The character carries the story. The story is a maze, but it doesn't become intriguing until the character enters into the maze.

A note on agents: They make their decisions on the first fifteen pages. The VOICE is the big cahuna. The voice is everything. Dave has found three important components of VOICE:

- POV Point of View. Become a master of POV. 3rd person close is tight, keyed to action...the
 main character DID something. In contrast, 3rd person distant is slower...the main character
 thought, he saw. Don't do that! Make the main character DO SOMETHING. Put it down on the
 page.
- Language and Syntax. Make sure your characters are immediately recognizable by their dialog. Avoid dialog that blurs the main character with others. Dave's favorite is LONESOME DOVE, Larry McMurtry's brilliant novel. There are POV shifts on every page, but you never lose track of the characters. His transitions are good because of the language and syntax he uses.
- Attitude of the Character: Your reader will look for the emotion in the conflict don't skip this.
 There is the motivation and the action, and also the reaction, where the emotion often lies.
 Include as many micro-conflicts as possible which can build those emotional connections.

Next, Dave gave us his Five Things that Make a Scene:

- Display character
- Advance the story
- Foreshadow upcoming events often in those micro-conflicts, which Dave uses to come back to later, picking up a thread to pull the story along.
- Set up transitions
- Milk all the emotion you can out of each scene.

Dave's next book has THREE plotlines. With one plotline, the reader might get bored, especially if they read a lot in the genre. Dave put all three plotlines in conflict, sequencing them in three scenes each, interlocked.

Dave's Four Ways to Open a Scene: (two are better than the other two).

- Description Dialog or action. Put the reader into the scene immediately.
- Movement with narrative voice and exposition, make sure the character is doing something.
- Crossroads / Options create three or four ways for the character to go. Then choose the one
 with the most conflict.
- Secondary Characters This is a good time to bring another character forward to facilitate the story. Use one already introduced. Give them flaws or they will turn into caricatures and bore your readers

After writing thirty-eight novels, Dave has developed a process that works well for him. On the first page of every novel, he endears the character to his readers, bringing them out organically by the way they think or act. Later, Dave will insert vignettes about the character's backstory.

How does he keep all those micro-conflicts straight? Dave's daily warmup is to start twenty pages back, where he edits the previous work. This gets him back into the mood. He tries NOT to bring that day's mood into the work. His manuscript is a living document, where he keeps Dialog, Action, and Narrative marked in different colors. Any imbalance shows immediately, and can be corrected.

How does he do all this? Dave Knows where he is at all times, but keeps a 'Hobby Book' going on the side for when his brain gets mushy.

Recommendations? Get Dwight Swain's *Techniques of a Selling Writer*Also, KNOW YOUR CHARACTER – Don't learn about your character as you go. Dave knows Bruno inside and out, backwards and forwards. He knows everything about him. In fact, he liked Bruno's backstory so much, Dave started writing prequels.

Write your book. Put it away. Write it again. Write it better. Improve it!

Read Raymond Chandler again. When things slow down, Chandler kills somebody. When you stall out, go back to the Five Things and find what is the weak link. Work on that.

Remember: Set your conflict up immediately on the first page. Your contract with your reader is, "This is what I'm going to tell you."

More recommendations: Stephen King, *On Writing*. Lawrence Block, *Telling Lies for Fun and Profit*. David Maas, The Breakout Novel.
