

January 19th Speaker – David Putnam "Dave on Writing"



Best-selling author David Putnam comes from a family of law enforcement and always wanted to be a



cop. During his career, he did it all: worked in narcotics, served on FBI-sponsored violent crimes teams, and was cross-sworn as a US Marshall pursuing murder suspects and bank robbers in Arizona, Nevada, and California. He served on the San Bernardino County Sheriff's SWAT team executing dynamic entries, hostage rescues, and serving as team sniper. He has worked in criminal intelligence and internal affairs and has supervised corrections, patrol, and a detective bureau.

Booklist sums up Putnam's Bruno Johnson series: "Bruno Johnson believes so passionately in justice that he'll lie, cheat, and steal to achieve it—and he'll pulverize anybody who gets in his way."


He will discuss the five things a scene needs to work, MAR, (Motivation, Action Reaction), and the three parts of voice.

She loves to create characters that become friends to whom people can relate, characters that make you care about what happens to them and who linger with long after you have put the book down. December Highlights – Paul Marks Write Short Stories Using Screenwriting Techniques

Paul D. Marks is the author of the Shamus Award-Winning noir mystery-thriller White Heat, set during the Rodney King "riots" and its sequel Broken Windows, take place in the 1990s, though the issues they deal with racism and

mystery-thrillers that take place in the 1990s, though the issues they deal with, racism and immigration, respectively, are still things firing up the news today.

Asked about his new novel, Marks said, "Broken Windows holds up a prism from which we can view the events burning up today's headlines, like the passionate immigration debate, through the lens of the recent past. It all comes down to the saying we know so well, 'the more things change, the more they stay the same.'"

His short story Windward, has been selected for the Best American Mystery Stories of 2018, edited by Louise Penny and Otto Penzler, and has also been nominated for both a 2018 Shamus Award and Macavity Award for Best Short Story.

Paul has a background as a script doctor. Script doctors are not usually credited in the movie, but can be depending on how much the writer contributed. When a book is made into a movie the original writer gets credit.

When asked to do a treatment he discovered that the outline for screenplay adapts to most writing. Using the process for short stories, a screenplay format is quick. It's all action after the slugline, with little interior monolog or dialog. He likes to let it go. No overthinking.

A short story can be hybrid of a screenplay, an easy outline. He likes to get to know his characters and let them do what they do. Essentially, a screenplay is a blueprint for a movie and can be the outline for any story. A novel is the finished product, built off the screenplay.

Paul opens his stories with a teaser, something to get people interested. A dead body in a trunk, for instance. Toward the end is the turning point that spins the story in a different direction. In short, a character, a conflict, and situations that build more conflict. And an ending that ties everything together. Simple, right?

For his process, Paul segments his scenes into slugline, action, and dialog using Final Draft. His rewrite moves into MS Word rich text, and then he works on a split screen for revisions.

Maddie's question: "What magic makes your stories win awards?"

Paul: Windward is a story that made it into the Best Mysteries of 2018 Anthology, but I don't know why. I just tried to do my best. For the Ellery Queen stories, the Ghost of Bunker Hill series, it is the setting of what Los Angeles was then and what it is now. The Ghost narrates.

What does a good short story need? A good structure with three acts, modified:

- A teaser a hook at the beginning
- First act + a plotpoint
- Second Act + a plotpoint
- Third Act finishes

Within each act and scene there is a beginning, a middle, and an end. If the writing goes on too long, look at the first and the third acts where the last third can be chopped off. You need to keep things moving. Elmore Leonard's advice: "Cut out all the parts people skip over."

Put a character in jeopardy and the reader will go with you. As in the movies, you have to SHOW. More thoughts will come out through what your characters DO. Show the character's choices, the problems, and how he solves them.

As far as VOICE, put in your unique voice later. You can stand up for what you believe and preserve that voice, but know when to fight and when to give in. When editing, Paul learned to give his authors leeway and not change the tone or the voice...because Hollywood ALWAYS wants to change the voice.

Characters are infused with their own way of looking at life. That certain point of view, that way of looking that comes across is also the voice. Some readers like this, some don't. You can resist changing it, or you can compromise.

Short stories are like symphonies, or mini-novels with subplots, minute characters. You can't explore as much as in a novel, but you can have an A and B story. The basic plot overall is to solve the problem. It's the character that speaks to the reader and where you can engage them. Who he is and why he is, when woven slowly into the story through action and scene description works.

Paul has been a judge for the Edgar and Shamus anthologies. He looks for unique characters, fully fleshed like a real person. He looks for a character that speaks to him, and an interesting plot that doesn't bog down.

An example of a key line: "I used to be somebody." The motivation is clear.

My early prose read like a screenplay without a slugline. I needed to expand on description. Raymond Chandler is a master of description, getting a feel for the place, its ambiance, its atmosphere.

On writing partners: There are disagreements. One wants to keep things, the other wants to cut. Some of the cuts can be saved for another script.

Serious situations in the context of the mystery stories are workable when expressed in a format that #1 is entertaining. Then the message is woven in.
