
Tanya Hutchison is a wife (of 30 years),



NPD, a company compiling statistics for 85% of the book industry through **Book Scan**, reports that 2020 was the US' bestselling year for print books in a decade. One-third of the growth in print in the United States was driven by juvenile fiction last year, as overall numbers comprised 751 million units. Print sales rose 8.2% for the year across major categories including adult nonfiction, juvenile, and teen categories.

HIGHLIGHTS: December 19, 2020 Ellen Byron Adding Humor to Your Mysteries

Ellen Byron is the Agatha Award-winning author of the Cajun Country Mysteries. The USA Today bestselling series has also won multiple Best Humorous Mystery Lefty awards from the Left Coast Crime conference. She also writes The Catering Hall Mysteries (under the pen name Maria DiRico), which launched with Here Comes the Body.



Ellen's TV credits include *Wings, Just Shoot Me*, and *Fairly OddParents*. She's written over 200 national magazine articles, and her published plays include the award-winning *Graceland*. She also worked as a caterer waiter for the legendary Martha Stewart, a credit she never tires of sharing. A native New Yorker who attended Tulane University, Ellen lives in Los Angeles with her husband, daughter, and rescue chi mix, Pogo. She still misses her hometown—and still drives like a New York.

"It's a Funny Thing: Easy Ways to Add Humor to Your Writing"

Ellen Byron is an accomplished author of published plays such as the award-winning *Graceland*; the television shows *Wings*, *Just Shoot Me*, and *Fairly Odd Parents*; and humorous mystery novels like the Cajun Country Mysteries for which she won an Agatha Award. In addition, she gained Best Humorous Mystery Lefty awards from the Left Coast Crime Conference. Having been a staff member of innumerable writer teams, Ms. Byron was well prepared to advise SCWA members on how to create good humor. A bit of cautionary advice to those new to this challenge: "Keep your humor current." In other words, "humor evolves." Byron suggests checking out comedies from every decade—the 30s, the 50s, the 70s—and note how humor changes and can get dated. "Some may be politically incorrect now." Also avoid "reference jokes." For example, no one later will get a Bob Dole joke [older politics]. For practice, she says to write a "non-reference version" of this joke: "I haven't seen that much plastic surgery since the Kardashian Christmas card."

Learn more precisely how people talk: Listen carefully to people's conversations; write some of it out for yourself. Especially try to catch the *conscious* choices of words a person makes in a particular situation. As an exercise, write down the specific word choices a manuscript character of yours makes. Don't yet try to be funny. The funny effect will rise when you place this character and his vocabulary choices in different interactions or situations. Next exercise: "Put two characters together and write a scene between them, exploring each's unique language AND behavior."

Next, pick an acquaintance/friend you find funny and "articulate exactly how they're funny." Then select another friend who's funny in a different way and "analyze their humor style." If no one in your personal life will work for this, use an actor or comedian you find humorous.

Now we focus on one of the characters who is to be funny in your story, novel, play or TV show. Commit to his/her type of humor by writing a few sentences that *describe* how he or she is funny. Is this person clever or clueless? Then have "two characters play off each other" maybe with sarcasm: "You don't think it looks good on me?"

Give your *protagonist* his/her own voice (style of speaking)—just as Jerry Seinfield has his own voice. You can have the person be funny but not really *joke* funny.

Be aware of the difference between *humor* [behavior?] and *jokes*. (As an aside, Byron said it's hard to have good-looking persons being funny because humor is usually a defense system.) She described a humorous scene in a VEEP program where Jonah is running to catch up with others, but his pants zipper keeps getting caught on his personal anatomy. Another humorous spike can be when a character yells at an inanimate thing. With jokes, infuse the language with similes and metaphors.

Humorous behavior can be written into all kinds of living or work situations, and it's funny because it's *real* [and could happen to us]. Byron described a scene where a cook or a chef cooks with fine, cast iron pots. Then, eek, one of the assistants finds that a dog has been eating out of and licking one of the pots. The kitchen staff holds a funeral for the pot, which now becomes a comic set piece. Big uproar. But later the pot shows up again—and, well, you get it.

Another example of using a comic set piece is the famous scene (episode 36) from Lucille Ball's *I Love Lucy* show where she and friend Ethel are working on the assembly line in Kramer's Kandy Kitchen, wrapping every piece of chocolate with paper and replacing it on the line. If they don't get all pieces done, they'll be fired. When the conveyor belt speeds up and they can't wrap each chocolate, they eat them. The speed increases. Besides their mouths, they stuff extra pieces in their blouses and bakery hats when a supervisor comes in to check that they're getting all done. Later when they go home, their husbands, to make up for some chore deficiencies of their own, have a present for the ladies: a big box of chocolates. Sometimes comic observations and actions are funny because they are so contrary to the expected behavior. Byron discussed a Seinfeld and Kramer scene where a funeral was being held for a business assistant, a heavy, sad scene. But the funeral contrasted with the big fancy meal afterwards and subsequent high spirits of the crowd.

When Program Director Maddie Margarita asked Ms. Byron about the relationship between comedy and tragedy, our speaker gave this example: In the food layout for a memorial, someone who cooked had forgotten to put any sugar in the brownies. The protagonist or others watch everyone's face change as they eat the odd-tasting brownies, but the watchers cannot laugh. In another example, the shoes for a previously dead person were put into a coffin for the next corpse.

Another area for humor uses the differences of cultural status between people. Byron mentioned the movie *Arthur* that has a butler with a highstatus attitude. He's oblivious that his manner is often humorous. However, "the reverse, low status, is not necessarily funny unless the low and the high-status characters bump into each other: for example, the housemaid who is more confident than the wealthy owner." For practice in status, Byron suggests listing "the status of your main characters from 1 to 4, with 1 being the highest status and 4 being the lowest. Write a brief exchange between two characters of different status."

The best placement for the kicker, funny word is at the end of the sentence. In an ongoing situation, use the comedy "Rule of Threes." This rule means repeating a significant fact or line three times, but in the last instance you've changed a critical word. "Comedy depends on the element of surprise." For "foot-in-the-mouth" humor, the character has to back track until he thinks he's gotten his blooper straightened out.

Ms. Byron says to amuse yourself while writing. "If you're enjoying yourself, so will others."




Always check the agency website and agent bio before submitting. Agents can switch agencies or close their lists, and submission requirements can change.
