




About NaNoWriMo

HIGHLIGHTS: Featured Speaker for December 2021 Lee Matthew Goldberg Writing a Reliable Unreliable Narrator



11-20-21 SCWA Highlights Lee Matthew Goldberg

"Writing a Reliable Unreliable Narrator—or Not!

With Lee Matthew Goldberg"

"We are all unreliable narrators," Lee Matthew Goldberg says, "because our memories just aren't 100 percent accurate when we relate our own stories. Thus, we fill in the gaps or exaggerate, even unintentionally." There are also narrators who steer you "through a seriously distorted version of events because they are insane, immature, dishonest, egocentric,

insecure, defensive, addicted, and/or immoral. These unreliable narrators are not to be trusted—but they are to be enjoyed."

Our speaker graduated with a Master of Fine Arts from the New School. He has been published in multiple languages and nominated for the Prix du Polar. (Other career details below.)

Five of Goldberg's eight novels use unreliable narrators, not all in first person: *The Mentor* has a book editor and an author who both appear unreliable. Other novels include *Stalker Stalked*, *Slow Down*, *Orange City*, and Goldberg's favorite, *The Ancestor*, whose protagonist is a mix of unreliable types.

Unreliable narrators fall into four types:

1. The Picaro--"A character who exaggerates" and is "the most reliable of the unreliable."

He is "a cynical and amoral rascal who, if given half a chance, would rather live by his wits than by honorable work. The picaro wanders about and has adventures among all people from all social classes and professions, often just barely escaping punishment for his own lying, cheating, and stealing."

2. The Madman--"Detached from reality."

- **3. The Naif**--"Abilities impacted by inexperience or age. His unreliability is unintentional. Naifs can even be likable and lovable as in *Forrest Gump*.
- **4. The Liar--**"Fabricates stories." The trickiest of the types. A narrator who intentionally misrepresents the truth, often for self-preservation. Goldberg says *Gone Girl* has one of the most complex unreliable narrators. "You read 40% before you realize someone is off."
 - Seven ways in which to create and incorporate twists, turns, and suspense in your story: Readers generally trust the narrator's story. You must set up these inconsistences with a plan; just being a pantser won't do it.
- **A.** "Keep your reader in the dark." Goldberg says to go against the "norm" where readers have more info than the characters do. "Have your narrator withhold certain information and see how it impacts the story."
- **B.** "Your narrator should be unreliable from the start." No one is totally accurate since people filter their point of view through their own experiences and beliefs. Early on, "hint at any qualities that might compromise them."
- **C.** "Let other characters be a sounding board." "Every character's interpretation of events is filtered through [his/her] own lens." What narrator inconsistences become apparent through what other characters say or do?
- **D.** "Experiment with just a pinch of unreliability." Even a morally good soul can give the reader misinformation because it fits in with his beliefs. "Even if your character is well-intentioned, give [him/her] unreliable moments to make [the person] slightly flawed—and, thus, more believable."
- **E.** "Add in an unpredictable act." When a reliable and thoughtful character unpredictably says or takes an action opposite of his usual habits or beliefs, the reader will view him/her differently—and afterward perhaps watch him/her carefully. What is the person capable of?
- **F.** "Muddy the Motivations." Creating a character "with conflicting or different drives" makes readers always unsure of the character's mindset. When he/she reacts to his/her shifts in motives, the ground also shifts beneath your reader's feet. These erratic changes can "unnerve your reader."
- **G.** "Keep Things Believable." To make all these tactics work, you, the author, must believe the character and his/her actions. Even if hard to believe, these inconsistences must still be "grounded in some type of reality."

Other Great Books/ Films with Unreliable Narrators: Catcher in the Rye, Lolita, As I Lay Dying, A Beautiful Mind, Notes on a Scandal, Shutter Island, The Sound and the Fury, and The Usual Suspects among others.

Goldberg's writing has also contributed to LitHub, *Pipeline Artists, The Los Angeles Review of Books, LitReactor, Fiction Writers Review, The Montreal Review*, and others.





- Publishing ... and Other Forms of Insanity, the newsletter for the website Published to Death, sends a monthly list of writers' conferences, fee free contests, and agents for all genres who are looking for submissions.
- For emerging writers, establishing a publications resume can be quite a challenge, especially if you have never published any of your work. But there always has to be a first—your intital short story, poem or personal essay published by a literary magazine.

Take heart, new writers! There are magazines that want your work, and will even pay you for it.

Also see: Mega-List of Science Fiction and Fantasy Magazines - Paying markets—Many speculative fiction magazines are happy to publish emerging writers.
