

Join us on May 15th at 10:00 a.m. when award-winning, Scottish-born author, **Catriona McPherson** with delight and confound us with her how-to guide, Sewing the Seeds of a Killer Mystery!



National-bestselling author, Catriona (kuh-TREE-nuh) McPherson, was born in Scotland and lived there until immigrating in 2010. She writes historical detective stories set in the old country in the 1930s. *The Turning Tide* (No.14) won a 2021 Lefty award and is nominated for an Agatha.

After eight years in the new country, Catriona kicked off the comic Last Ditch Motel series, which takes a wry but affectionate look at California life and has won two Leftys for best humorous mystery. 





HIGHLIGHTS: Featured Speaker for April 2021 Baron R. Birtcher Creating Conflict in Your Story



Creating Conflict in Your Story

with Baron Birtcher

Baron Birtcher is an award-winning author who is known for his hardboiled mysteries such as his Mike Travis series (*Roadhouse Blues, Ruby*

Tuesday, Angels Fall, and *Hard Latitudes*), the Ty Dawson series (*South California Purples, Fistful of Rain--*the 2019 Best Book of the Year), and more. However, when VP of Programming Maddie Margarita requested that he speak on creating conflict, he was excited but also caught by surprise. Incredulously, he'd never before analyzed how he creates this foundational element. With a big smile, he thanked Ms. Margarita for the topic.

Not a "pantser," Birtcher says he "doesn't give structure [much thought] before writing." He outlines his story in a freeform way. He compared the branches of his outline to those of a Christmas tree. One branch reveals why this character is here; another indicates why the character is speaking "Words are [the] decorations."

However, Birtcher works instinctively while he considers the internal, interpersonal, environmental, manmade, accidental conflicts, and "hundreds of more variations. All serve a different purpose in the story." They can fill "a lull in the narrative, a cull de sac [no forward movement] in the writer's story." His advice and practice are to fill any cull de sac by "revealing something about all your characters. Show, not tell."

Birtcher likes conflict to start in the setting itself because you can always "lean on it." "What's going on in the town? Separated factions?" Because he likes the setting to be "sort of a sonic wallpaper," he crafts conflict into the setting and into the narrative as he goes. These "bread crumbs" get sprinkled into each of the characters' dialogue.

Our speaker says to expose the protagonist with more brevity by setting up an expository scene within some conflict. His response should cover the character's inner motivation and can even reveal a villain. These situational scenes provide foreshadowing which is helpful near the end of Act II when you have a similar, but larger situation.

"I love things that are important later," says Birtcher. Even a one-page scene can expose a character's inner self—"all in the action of what he did or did not do." This weakness will rise again at a critical point. "Perfect characters are boring and don't exist in real life." But if a character has made a mistake while dealing with the central plot, "only a foolish main character would make the same mistakes again and again."

Birtcher says each of his characters has a particular area of expertise, his "superpower," which can be a redeeming characteristic. But a protagonist has personal flaws he's aware of and those he's "unaware of." A secondary character can remind the main character that he's completely out of step." He repeated: "Perfect characters are boring and don't exist in real life."

This award-winning author finds it difficult to portray a character's time or spell of self-reflection. He says he accomplishes the same benefit by illustrating a character's "getting himself slapped around—the big fall/stumble in his learning of self."

Birtcher says his protagonist Mike Travis creates his own conflict because he's not empathetic to the people closest to him. Thus, he sometimes winds up creating his own trouble. "Even when we learn about our own personal flaws, we don't always fix them."

Asked when he gets to know his characters, Birtcher said that a character just reveals himself to Birtcher and also turns up to have vulnerabilities this author didn't first perceive.

Our speaker referred to the current PBS series about legendary author Ernest Hemingway, whose descriptions and styles he loves. He commented that Hemingway's style will sometimes demonstrate that "the things that go unsaid in his stories—such as angst—are the most important." Hemingway purposely doesn't express what all the readers are thinking.

Baron Birtcher's pet peeve of any story is "a murky middle." "FIX IT!" he stresses. "Reveal, reveal, reveal." When editing, fix a murky middle by having your characters follow through.

Warning: To avoid chaos, Birtcher says to be sure you keep a list of the conflicts you've put into your novel and how they all relate. "Track your characters, even the walk-ons so in Act III you can organically show the resolution."

Birtcher's joy of life and of writing clearly emanate through his open manner and enthusiasm. He does suggest one caution, however, to all Beta readers whom authors trust more than regular readers: "Be careful. [The author] can't *unhear* things. Don't say arbitrary things to writers."
