NEWS ABOUT LIVE MEETINGS

Dear Writers,

We have been working with several locations to obtain a place to hold a live monthly meeting once again. We are working now with four locations on pricing and hope to have good offers of value within a few weeks, but we would like to be live by September.

I thank each of you who have sent leads and ideas, and we have followed up on all.

Location is a key, as we do need a place reasonably close to a freeway. There is a restaurant, a golf course, an Elks Club, a library that allows catering, and a meeting hall in the mix.

Most locations have just received rules from the state for gatherings, and we are working within that. Certainly, we can use a venue with no food, such as a library or hall, but an element of SCWA was our fellowship at tables as we shared meals and ate. Somehow that seems lost without a meal. However, we have offers to look at from a golf course, where we would bring in the catering. Catering might not have to be full meals, so there are diverse options. And of course, perhaps some people are not ready to do a gathering, which is certainly understanding. In that matter we have discussed also doing live and Zoom at the same time. In the end, a big portion of the solution is the pricing, and that is the key point of negotiation now.

Claim Jumper was ideal for its liberal allowance of us on Saturday mornings, which many locations are using for weddings. Hopefully, we will have some solutions for the Board to look at before next month, and we will offer you our suggestions.

We are so grateful for your continued participation in SCWA, and we have all worked together to bring a multitude of offerings on Zoom that will continue even after we are able to have a live meeting.

The work of Maddie Margarita and Diana Pardee has drawn viewers from as far away as Australia, Africa, and Europe, as well as all areas of the United States, and we would certainly continue our great presentations.



the Soul-The Empowered Woman.



HIGHLIGHTS: Featured Speaker for June 2021 Shawn Reilly Simmon Secrets to Crafting Impactful Short Stories



Short stories aren't about word count. Short stories are about making your words count!

Award-winning, short story writer and editor Shawn Reilly Simmons talks about the basics of short story writing and making your story resonate.

Secrets to Crafting Impactful Short Stories: Making Your Words Count with Shawn Reilly Simmons

Shawn Reilly Simmons compares writing a short story to having a palette cleansing. You can complete this new idea that's running around in your head without needing to reload mentally your other projects. Being the author of seven novels in the Red Carpet Catering Mysteries series, Simmons certainly knows about complex writing projects. She's on the Board of Malice Domestic and is also a co-owner/publisher and editor of Level Best Books. In addition, she's a member of Sisters in Crime, Mystery Writers of America, the International Thriller Writers, and U.K.'s Crime Writers Association.

Simmons says her writing career is the most fun when she's writing short stories. "Short" comes in several categories: **traditional** short stories run 1,000-7,000 words, **flash fiction** is 1,000 words or less, a **drabble** is 100 words exactly, **microfiction** has 300 words or less, and there are **six-word stories**.

The next critical characteristic is the smaller, comprehensive factor of the plot. Although a novel and a short story have the arc of a beginning, conflict, and resolution, Simmons compares their different scopes. "Writing a novel is like building a house with multiple levels and rooms, an attic and basement to explore throughout the story." A *short story*, however, "is like focusing on one room of that house and narrowing your focus to what happens there."

Ms. Simmons' short stories have won awards: "The Last Word," published in *Malice Domestic 14: Mystery Most Edible*, won the Agatha Award for Best Short Story in 2020. She also won the Anthony Award for *Best Anthology or Collection* for co-editing the same anthology. These other anthologies also include her stories: "Burnt Orange" is in *Passport to Murder*, the 2017 Bouchercon Anthology; "The Prodigy" in Mystery Tour, the Crime Writers' Association Anthology; and "Now Is the Hour" in Writers Crushing Covid-19.

Although Ms. Simmons trained as a classical musician, she always knew she wanted to be a writer. She says to write about something that is a passion inside of you. She does not outline nor use any characters from her novels. Mentally, she starts every story with a "What if?" "You have to find something you really believe in."

If you are not an outliner either, as you go, clarify to yourself the **setting**—where the story takes place, the **character/narrator**--whom the story is about, the **conflict**—"what motivates your characters," the **plot**—"what actions will your characters do," and the **theme**—"what is the overarching message of the story."

The structure of a short story is "centered around one experience or significant moment, the **inciting incident** that sets the story in motion." Is the **time** element linear, or "does it move back and forth in time?" For the **climax**, when do "the actions or decisions of the characters come to a head?" The **resolution** will be when the "central question of the inciting incident has been addressed or resolved."

"Create unique characters that stand apart from each other on the page." Individualize and "add depth your characters by varying the way they speak or behave." "Create challenges for your characters that they can handle in a number of ways." Sessions says you can have a character use a word wrong or one who puts his napkin under his chin instead of his lap.

Ms. Simmons says to be economical in writing short stories." Cut words back when you can." Don't do a lot of internal thoughts, and you "can just get rid of dialogue tags."

All plot issues in the story need to be resolved. Most stories will tell or give a message, but they don't always need to. Make sure your short story is "the cleanest it can be." Re-read it many times to ensure it doesn't fizzle out at the end. "CARE about your work before you send it out" (for publication).


