
She's a graduate of the College of William & Mary and is based in New York City.

Highlights: July 2020 Tori Eldridge



Dreaming of Writing for TV, Looking to Master the Art of Pacing, or Hoping to Write a Kick-Ass Thriller

Tori Eldridge was already an accomplished Broadway singer, dancer, and actor when she decided twenty years ago to embrace fiction writing. Along the way somewhere she "got obsessed with martial arts," a new path, and gained a fifth-degree blackbelt. Understanding strategies for difficult situations, she also developed a new structure for novels, the Four-Act structure, which made her mysteries and thrillers earn awards.

Eldridge's family background influences her greatly. As her website, <u>torieldridge.com</u>, says, she had "a Norwegian father from North Dakota and a Chinese-Hawaiian mother from Maui who met, married, and raised Tori's sisters in Japan." Ms. Eldridge attended Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois. "Her greatest book research trips have been in Bali, Rio de Janeiro, Shanghai, and Hong Kong." Across the United States she's taught seminars on ninja arts, weapons, and women's self-protection.

Before writing for herself, Ms. Eldridge adapted books to screenplays for movies and television series for her husband's business. "What's on a page in the book may not show up in the screenplay," she says. "The screenplay is actually the last act of a novel." About then someone advised her to write a novel. When she published her first short story in *Suspense Magazine* in 2014, she knew she would expand it into a novel. On her journey, several of her short stories were published in anthologies.



Her first novel, *The Ninja Daughter* (Lily Wong Book 1), was published in Nov. 2019 and named one of the "Best Mystery Books of the Year" by The South Florida Sun Sentinel, awarded "2019 Thriller Book of the Year" by Authors on the Air Global Radio Network, and nominated for the "Anthony and Lefty Awards." Soon afterward, saying she needed that sense of security and confidence, Ms. Eldridge began writing her second Lily Wong book. *The Ninja's Blade* will be released on Sept. 1, 2020.

"All projects start with research" which gives birth to all plots and characters and finally a logline/premise. Ms. Eldridge says she might write a paragraph and then go hiking while talking to herself along the way about the bigger picture. She progresses to filling in spots with more hikes and then comes home and writes them out. Her next step used to be Post-It notes, but now she opens Scrivener.

Act I is the whole story's setup—all key people, all plots. "Not every chapter ends with a hook but does have a special sentence at the end. Maybe it's about an emotion that can be used for romance or even literary fiction."

Act II. Screenwriters carefully divide this part into 2nd and 3rd acts for pacing. Ms. Eldridge says that allows her to have a climax and a turning point for each section to hopefully keep readers engaged. There is a climb to the middle of the book where action is taken on the raised issues: investigation, confrontation. "A book has a question and an answer." The reader learns more about the characters and relationships.

Act III is "an exciting time. You find out there's something you didn't understand."

Act IV. "Now all comes together in an adrenaline rush that winds everything up." She declares that it's the easiest to write "because your foot is on the accelerator. Drama has to happen because all threads need to weave together for a satisfying conclusion."

Ms. Eldridge is quite analytical as to how everything fits together and has "no problem with outlining." For each novel she makes a Scrivener binder that she divides into four folders with chapters and scenes for each act. Left side of the screen lists the folder and notes, text blocks in the center of her screen, and on the right is her outline. In her notes she puts a summary of what's going to happen by describing the plot and character development of each chapter. At this point, she becomes aware which acts are bloated with too much setup. However, some acts may need more sub-plot. For example, in Chapter 14, she may need a turn-around character or has to return to Chapter 2 and insert a clue.

For turning points, beats, and climaxes, she has to end with something exciting. Having planned ahead helps her with the balance in the relationships, culture, and authenticity in an action thriller. She used to use color Post-Its with a different color for action or "cool ninja stuff," family issues, part of a romance, or a piece of a subplot. They allow her to monitor the novel's pace and balance. Ms. Eldridge said she hasn't read about a lot of other authors' methods because her writing career started with screenplays. "Screenplays are probably the most structured stories."

When asked about action scenes, Ms. Eldridge says, "Easy for me. I'm really visual. If I can see something, I can describe it." In fact, she sometimes uses a random face photo from the internet to visualize one of her characters. All of the action in *The Ninja Daughter*, she says she's "done it, executed it, or researched it." She studies writing about a character who may be tied in a warehouse, on a scaffold, or confined, thinking "How am I going to get out of this? How close do I have to be to the enemy?" Ms. Eldridge might roll around on the floor while figuring it out. One time she walked into her husband's office and asked him, "May I borrow your neck?"

Ms. Eldridge claims to always "tie action to emotion." How does this fight feel for the characters—the adrenaline, the physicality? She interviewed owners of particular weapons, such as special Japanese swords, and for weeks searched the internet for just the right one for her ninja character. Since action is—well—action, how can she tie a fight scene to a character's emotion? A character might retain powerful memories associated with his knife or sword. So, when he pulls out that particular weapon, the readers gulp because they have accepted what painful memories it represents to its wielder. This type of emotional aspect does not slow action or bury the point of the scene.

Again, Ms. Eldridge strongly believes in outlining and also your trying 3X5 cards and/or colored cards to move around on a board, a table, or the floor. With *The Ninja's Blade*, she had to re-envision the plot six times before it ultimately became the villain's story, which changed the whole structure.

When asked if she's a ninja, Ms. Eldridge replied, "Yes, I'm a modern-day ninja—like thousands of people around the world." Asked if she's had to use her ninja experience, her answer is again "Yes. I use it every day to create harmony in my home to keep everyone flowing at their peak capacity."
