President's Message for September 2021 from Larry Porricelli

Hello SCWA Writers.

I heard a lecture not too long ago about issues faced today by writers and believe I can relate to you the essence of its ideas. They are valuable ideas for all of us as writers and authors.

- 1. Too many writers.
- 2. Too much competition.
- 3. Too many used and re-used ideas.
- 4. Too many critics.
- 5. Too many ways to promote.

Some answers:

- 1. Sure, there are many today who tap their fingers on a keyboard, may have a website set up, and many talented writers can seem to drown in a sea of untalented hacks. And yes, today a writer has to prove their value amidst so many valueless books.
- 2. The internet is filled with many mediocre writers and authors, but be of good cheer as a reader and teacher I have read almost all the works or pieces of works of SCWA writers and authors, and believe it, you have talent and easily float to the top upon the oceans of unexceptional writers. Your depth of skill is clear. Please do not doubt yourself, even for a second.
- 3. While so much information is disseminated on the web to the world, and ideas are hard to come by, I noticed you as a group have

taken the ordinary in whatever field you write, and made it extraordinary. More so, you have made it unique. Uniqueness in literature today seems hard to find, but I see no two writers in SCWA with the same style. Your work is always fresh. Additionally, your unique styles have interesting plot twists, unexpected literary tricks, atypical characters, and more!

- 4. Everyone with a keyboard can consider themselves a critic today, but fear not, do not hide your work, and do not doubt yourself. You are unique and I have never heard so many plots twisted and turned around stories. One of our members, Barbara Howe, is a legitimate critic, or reviewer. Visit her on FB and see what a wonderful reviewer has to say and you will be vastly encouraged with your writing!
- 5. There are so many ways to promote, be clever, use what is valid to your audience.

50 Shades of Grey had a lot of buzz about it. But if you had read 120 Days of the Sodom, you knew 50 Shades was new twist on an old idea.

Conclusion: Writing is about ability and technique, and writing discovers and addresses issues common to all, and somehow finds solutions to them. In *Fahrenheit 451*, Bradbury took a very challenging idea of books being banned as threats to independent thinking against a tyrant, and solved the issue of banned free speech and thinking and falling in love with a great plot ending—people memorized whole books and became living testaments to creativity.

Enjoy your work. Your work is valuable. Know that, and keep writing!





His textbook *The Art of Character* was published by Penguin. Writer's Digest published his follow-up, *The Compass of Character*, in October 2019.



Writing a Page Turner: Crafting Scenes and Dialogue That Propel Your Story Forward with Andrea Bartz

"The big picture for writing a page-turner," says Andrea Bartz, "is tracking the hero as he/she faces each obstacle." Ms. Bartz certainly ought to know. She's had three thrillers in a row on *The New York Times Best Seller List* (which she says is better than *Amazon News*). They are her debut thriller, *The Lost Night* (2019), *The Herd* (2000), and *We Were Never There* (July 2021).

Ms. Bartz's presentation stressed the two basic issue writers should have foremost in mind: "What do I want my readers to feel [such as anxiety]?" and "What are my readers trying to figure out—why was something done?"

This author says to intentionally make your first draft overdramatic. Look at all the stakes and then take them over the top. [Specifics later.] Examine again the main character who comes out on the final page. Sometimes a character in that first draft has achieved his goal but doesn't seem to feel satisfied. What he/she wants is actually something deeper, so you need to make sure the major character is in the driver's seat. Do not just simply have things happen to him but revise to show him making his decisions happen. "A character shouldn't be just reactive but co-operative." Maybe the character is stuck at the start and is self-sabotaging and even pushes people away. Also, it's hard to root for a character who gets everything he wants. You have "to nourish

the goals they want." If the reader doesn't like a character, it's probably because he doesn't understand why the character is doing what he/she is.

Crafting the REVISION

- Show the active ways a character is stuck in his self-sabotage. What if he had made different choices? When Ms. Bartz revises, she goes to a scene and assigns it a color trait to help her track the increase of tension.
- When do you add a scene or cut a scene? If one is cut, will the storyline still make sense? "Maybe the point of it can be put into another scene written earlier."
- Make sure every character can be distinguished from your protagonist.
- Some scenes authors are afraid to write. Do not resort to putting that material into a dream a person wakes up from.
- Inspect all your time jumps. Does anything happen that affects the reader's understanding of the scene?
- Introduce mini-mysteries in the first twenty percent of the story.
- Put exposition into a different scene from most of the story—perhaps where characters can exchange expository material. Build momentum towards a reveal with a touch of foreshadowing. "At least _____ hasn't happened," says a character.
- Every obstacle thrown at the main character should not only be tailored for him/her but become harder. (Remember the coloring tactic?)
- Has it been clear what the character wants here and there? If not clear, how does the reader know if the character had the success he needed?
- The opponents don't always have to be villains or enemies. In fact, opponents don't have to be characters. They can be a storm or feelings—such as a lack of morality.
- The main problem for the main character can also be a traditional set of norms or expectations that are not working for him/her.
- A key idea especially for thrillers is to have the hero think he and his situation are okay at the time. Then "pull the rug out."
- Backstory is necessary when the character doesn't want to think about or examine a situation, an idea, or a particular place, etc. This "opponent" can be a storm or even feelings, such as a lack of morality.

Because of her other professional obligations, Ms. Bartz uses the Pomodoro Technique and www.Pacemaker.Press for efficiency when working on novels. She writes 1,000 words a day in two hours and takes weekends off.


