




Jonathan Brown released Chloe in June 2022 for

Level Best Books. In 2021, he released *Character Is What Counts—a* novel based on the life of Vince Lombardi for Mentoris Books. *Character* was Brown's second book with Mentoris. *A Boxing Trainer's Journey—a* novel based on the life of Angelo Dundee, was the first in 2019. Both books received favorable *Kirkus* reviews.









Brown received the first ever Neely Scholarship Award (from the Mystery Writers of America) in 2021. The third book in the Lou Crasher series, *Drums*, *Guns 'n' Money* will be released in March 2023 from

Down and Out Books. Alma Boucher with Reader's Favorite Book Reviews said, "*Drums, Guns 'n' Money* is a gripping story of murder and crime. I was glued to the pages from the start. 5 stars."

The Defender, a standalone about an executive protection expert whose client, an impressive female entrepreneur, is a victim of more than one kidnapping attempt—is currently in the works.

Brown recently narrated *The Ridders* by Lisa Towles, which is available now. Earlier in 2022, Brown narrated *A Baker's Divorce* by Frank Scalise, which is also available now. Having spent most of 2022 battling multiple myeloma, a cancer in the leukemia family, Brown never stopped writing, narrating, exercising, and keeping the faith. He owes most of his winning battle to his wife, Sonia. In addition, with love and support from countless friends and family and an unwavering positive attitude, Brown has no doubt love is what got him through the tough times.



HIGHLIGHTS January Speaker: Chris Hauty

"Writing Tips from Famous Writers"

Famous detective fiction writer, Raymond Chandler, who created Philip Marlowe, once put out this advice: "Throw up in your typewriter every morning and clean up every noon." Our speaker, Chris Hauty, who never took a writing class, began writing in high school, continued in college, and then for a profession. In his forty-five years of writing, Hauty says he's "never been blocked." As he developed his own style, he wrote "in the styles of prior authors." He presented twelve tips from other authors and insisted SCWA members guess from which author each tip comes.

First, Hauty's career: His screenwriting became a profession with *Don Coyote*, his modern interpretation of Cervantes's *Don Quixote* [from 1605 and 1615] directed by Jonathon Lynn. Some of Hauty's other screenplays are Disney's *Homeward Bound: Lost in San Francisco*, *Arena*—a gladiator epic, *Moby Dick, Beautiful Killer*, and *Land of Legend*—a Viking saga. Recent films are *Never Back Down* and *Sniper: Ghost Shooter*, starring Billy Zane.

Hauty's novel production began with *Deep State* and includes *Savage Road*, *Storm Rising* (out this May)—about white supremacy in the military, and the acclaimed novella, *Insurrection Day*. He's now writing screenplays with female protagonists.


- Tip #1: "Always stop while you're going good. Then begin the next day." Ernest Hemingway. In other words, don't worry about it. Hauty explained, "If you end the day being stuck, it's hard to get going the next day. End on a scene that's working."
- Tip #2: "Abandon the idea that you're ever going to finish." <u>John Steinbeck</u>. In other words, lose track of your 400-page goal and just concentrate on this one day.
- Tip #3: "Start as close to the end as possible." <u>Kurt Vonnegut</u>. Get your reader into the plot as soon as you can.
- Tip #4: "Don't be nervous. Work calmly, joyously, and recklessly." Henry Miller. Don't stay safe.
- Tip #5: "No time for poetry but only for exactly what is." <u>Jack Kerouac</u>. Get to the point for the audience.
- Tip #6: "Never use a long word where a short one will do." <u>George</u> Orwell.
- Tip #7: "The main rule of writing: if you do it with enough assurance and confidence, you're allowed to do whatever you like." Damon Runyon.
- Top #8: "Follow the characters and see where they go instead of following the plot." <u>Stephen King</u>.
 - Tip #9: "Leave out the parts readers tend to skip." Elmore Leonard.
- Tip #10: "Don't tell me the moon is shining but describe the moon's glint off the glass." Anton Chekhov.
 - Tip #11: "Substitute damn every time you're writing very." Mark Twain
- Tip #12: "If you want to be a writer, then DO it..." [piece missing] Michael Connelly.


Chris Hauty said our SCWA meeting was the first time he's spoken with a variety of writers, but here and there during his presentation he mentioned details of his own routines. These could be used by writers in a variety of genres. His daily quota is 1000 words a day, but he mentioned that Stephen King's was 2000 a day. He also tells himself, "Today is a great day." He stops at 5:00 or 5:30 for lunch. During his 9:00-5:00 workday, he plays music with no lyrics and feels himself excited. He might take one day off but if it's more, he loses track of what he's been writing. As time has gone on, he's been less inclined to write outlines. For minor characters he writes one or two paragraphs of their lives to help him keep their characters consistent. Writing the first draft takes him four to five months—until he's "getting sick of it." The best, Hauty says, is when the first draft takes only two to three months. Afterward he goes through that first draft two times.


Hauty says, "I'm all about reveals and twists." He too advises his listeners to start their novels "close to the end" because he believes strongly in Vonnegut's Tip 3. But this writer of thrillers knows he must be original. He ended with "Every day I even try to defy my own expectations of where the plot's going to go."




2023 New Year's Resolution for Writers: Motivation
