





HIGHLIGHTS March 2023 Speaker: Antoine Wilson

Antoine Wilson is the author of the novels Mouth to Mouth (2022), Panorama City (2012), and The Interloper (2007). Antoine's Mouth to Mouth was featured on President Obama's Reading List. His other work has appeared in The Paris Review, StoryQuarterly, and The Best New American Voices, among other publications. He is a contributing editor of A Public Space.



The Surprising Revelations and Rewards of Revision

The day after St. Patrick's Day, many SCWA members were still dressed for and celebrating St. Patrick's, as was our speaker, Antoine Wilson. He checked our knowledge of Irish literature and its authors with several questions. First, in what language was *The Book of Kells* written [with four Christian gospels in 800 A.D.]? In Gaelic? Nope. Latin.

"On which city was Bram Stoker born, the one who wrote *Dracula*?" Answer: Dublin. So Irish lit can go from the Bible to a legendary vampire. Our meeting's Irish atmosphere reminded Wilson of his first nudge to writing when only a boy. A big crime had occurred in Los Angeles where the Wilson family lived. The murder [?] took place at the well-known Molly Malone's Irish Pub on Fairfax Ave. Antoine's father wanted his son to write a novel about it.

Thus, at a young age, Antoine Wilson absorbed the goal of writing novels. As an adult, however, Wilson realized writing is one thing, but *revision* is a different breathing and living critter. Our speaker presented his ups and downs with it, what he's learned about those problems and about himself, and how to revise effectively.

One of Wilson's first endeavors was finished years later to become *Mouth to Mouth*, "the story of a writer whose rise in the art world won't acknowledge the dark side of ambition." Wilson was "not an outliner" but now does so after the first draft. He enrolled in a writing workshop where he was told "in six months you'll finish your novel." Actually, he spent eight months on the first chapter with eight drafts. Then his first chapter became a short story.

His next step was to read books about revision and the danger of being a perfectionist. You're more critical of yourself if you've read good literature—but we all need to read good lit. "Close the door—with no one looking over your shoulder. Nobody else can see what a bad writer you are." But then he realized that any draft he wrote/writes won't be the last: he'll also find *good* things he likes even though he doesn't always know where some of those fresh ideas come from.

During revision, a process of *exploring*, *shaping*, and *polishing*, you need to get distance because you can never be your own naïve reader. "Why is this in here?" Workshops help; also have your computer read your rough draft to you. Wilson says he "learned more from critiquing other people's stories than from their critiques of mine." Sometimes you need to put your draft away "for three weeks or three months." At one time he went back and forth between two books he wound up quitting. For one that he refers to as his "Island Book, a nonfiction that refused to turn into fiction," he acceded, "No, this isn't going to work." It is now in a drawer.

Wilson recommends Stein on Writing by Sol Stein, which helps moving from vagueness to specificity. Also, he likes Matt Bell's Refuse to Be Done: How to Write and Rewrite a Novel in Three Drafts." He uses Scrivener's app to organize his materials and a thesaurus to get its words "on the tip of his tongue" because we all have a listening vocabulary versus our speaking vocabulary. For the reader we need to "move from information to experience." In other words, "Show, don't tell."

Wilson admires those writers who find a situation that they can show reflects life. What's the underlying meaning of why *this* character is telling the story? Examine how you structure your story. "Most of it is scene and summary. What's the rhythm?" "Follow the energy. Be alert to those reactions of your own curiosity." The ending of the novel always relates to its beginning. By the end of your revision, you'll know for sure how the beginning should be written. "All the previous shadows look different."

At the end, Wilson was asked when he's ready for the professional editor. He uses "a good writer friend" and usually three others who critique his novel beforehand. He couldn't recall how many drafts he usually has.

Revision has taught Antoine Wilson another deep factor of how his mind works. Earlier he had said he was not an outliner. He's learned that his "creative brain" is not as quick or spontaneous as his usual brain. That's why his ideas to use in a novel get better as he proceeds through its stages: "the flowers of afterthought." As a result, Wilson demonstrated that the whole revision process is not only constructive but quite enriching.

Mouth to Mouth was finally published in 2022 by Avid Reader Press / Simon & Schuster. It was a *Time* Best Book of the Year and declared "One of Barack Obama's Favorite Books of 2022." Other novels of his are *The Interloper* (2007) and *Panorama City* (2012).

- Write your review and "submit"


